Zero and first conditional

Conditional Sentences

MEANING



We use the term conditional to describe sentences with two clauses, often beginning with **IF**. The if clause is the **condition** and the other clause is the **result**.

Generally, the if clause comes **first** but the clauses can go in either order without changing the meaning.

The zero conditional

MEANING

We use the zero conditional to talk about things that are **TRUE**, that we think are true or that we want to present as true.

If you want a different job, there are lots to choose from.



The zero conditional

FORM



If + subject + verb + object complement ,
If you like what you do ,

subject + verb + object complement
it makes work more rewarding.

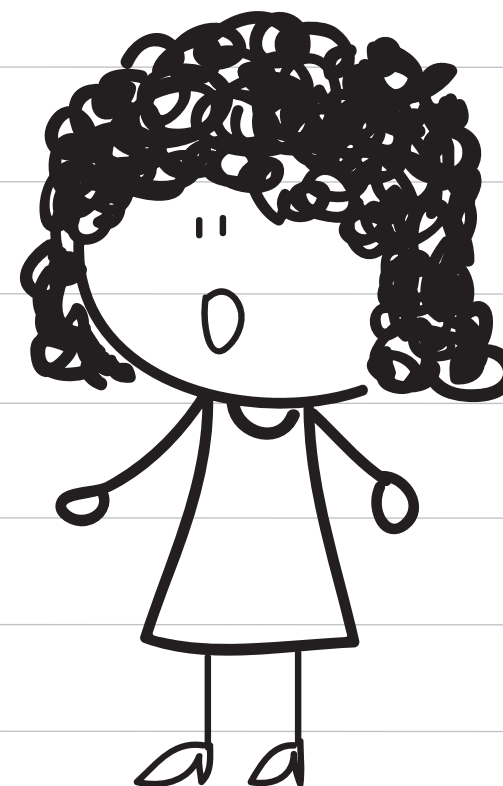
The first conditional

MEANING

We use the first conditional to talk about something that **MIGHT HAPPEN** or where the speaker wants to make it clear that one thing relies upon another.

If you come to my office,

I'll go through the project plan with you.



The first conditional

FORM



If + subject + verb + object complement ,

If it is too expensive ,

subject + will + verb + object complement

we will have to think again.
